

DIET AND HEALTH HINTS

By DR. T. J. ALLEN Food Specialist

"Fish caught by the gills and allowed to die in the water by slow degrees, as in the case where gill nets are used, undergo decomposition very readily and are inferior as food," says a bulletin of the department of agriculture. "Fish are often landed alive," says this authority, "and allowed to die slowly. This custom is not only inhuman but lessens the value of the fish. I have frequently emphasized in these Hints the necessity of care in the preparation of animal food. The frightening of cattle before they are killed and the swinging of poultry by the head and throwing them upon the ground to writhe develop toxins in the tissues.




