SENATE MAY NOT CONFIRM PATTERSON

Tillman, Vardaman and Other Southerners Will Oppose His Confirmation

IF CONFIRMED MUST STAND FOR "JIMCROWISM"

J. C. Napier Highly Commended For Resigning Rather Than Accepting Segregation.

Washington, July 31-Adam E. Patterson, who has been named to succeed James C. Napier as Register of the Treasury, after the latter resigned rather than submit to "jimcrow" regulations in the Treasury building, may not be confirmed. Tillman, Vardaman, Hoke Smith and other Southern bourbons have announced that they are going to fight any nomination of a colored man, though he be a Democrat.
