Wyo and told him he intended to manumit negro
Hannah and her children to which the said
Ireland replied she is none of yours and you can
not do it, that Barniclow then flew in a violent
passion and said he would do as he pleased for
he had raised the negroes; upon Cross examination
the said Ireland declared that he the said Ireland
never did claim those negroes as his own.

The defendant also called one Levin Woodall as
a witness by whom he proved that some years
ago the said Barniclow came to a place called

Point with the Sheriff who had a demand
against him to borrow money of one Nathan
Peacock, who told him he had better sell one of
his negroes - Barniclow replied the negroes were
none of his but belonged to his daughter, that
this conversation took place in the hearing of the
