Light breeze fine weather At 3 The first Division of the Army were embarked in the Boats - and at Daylight they were landed at North Point. miles of Baltimore and immediately moved on in the direction of the Town A few videttes which were posted at a house a short distance from the Landing Place were made Prisoners By 12 O'clock the whole of the Troops and Artillery had landed. The small arm Seamen & Marines were also landed The Cheneaux arrived with the Prizes from the Potomac all marked or numbered as Transports and saluted the Commander in Chief. The Frigates moved up anchored near the Town At about 10 O'clock while the advance was skirmishing with the Enemy, Maj. General Ross was mortally wounded, and died while being carried down to the boat. his body was sent on board the Royal Oak about 2 O'clock our Troops attacked a very superior force of the Enemy and repulsed them with con- siderable loss</p>
