Monday	12 th	Easterly	<p>At anchor of Chandeleur Island</p> <p>A.M. Light breezes & fair Squadron & Conway standing in and anchoring. The Launches and Barges of the Squadron manned & armed with Carronades in all about 40 in number were sent under the orders of Captain Lockyer of H.M. Ship Sophie to attack a flotilla of the Enemy's Gun Boats which had made their appearance a few days before off Cat Island.</p> <p>P.M. Flat boats, cutters &c employed shifting Troops from the line of Battle Ships to the Troop Frigates and Transports.</p>				
Tuesday	13 th	N.W.	<p>At anchor of Chandeleur Island</p> <p>A.M. Light breezes & fine Boats employed shifting Troops, Guns, and Ammunition into the small vessels. Troop Frigates & Transports moving up to the anchorage between Cat Island & the Main. At 5 p.m. struck my flag on board the Royal Oak and hoisted it in the Seahorse lying off Ship Island. The Commander in Chief hoisted his flag on board the Arminde. Observed several guns fired in the direction of our Boats.</p>				
Wednesday	14 th	N.W.	<p>Seahorse at anchor of Cat Island</p> <p>A.M. Noisy fine. Frigates Troop Ships & Transports moving up to the anchorage between Cat Island and the Main. At 11 heard a very heavy Cannonade in the direction of our Boats and the Enemy's Flotilla.</p>
