It is not Mr. Thomas' fault but the City's deficiency in the point of office room that compels him to obtain an office outside of any public building. You should, however, take a receipt from him in detail for the office furniture with which you supply him, and deliver this receipt to the Comptroller.

The fact that Mr. Thomas has asked for and received office furniture belonging to the City would constitute such an invitation, in my opinion, as to authorize you, if you deem the same necessary, to inspect the furniture at intervals at his office, for the purpose of satisfying yourself as to the condition in which it is kept.
