Hence, in my opinion, you are powerless to substitute gaeiss curbing for granite curbing in the matter of the proposed curbing on Evergreen Terrace.

DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC SAFETY, SUB-DEPT. OF HEALTH.

Hon. F. Cabell Bruce, 

At a meeting of the Board of Public Safety, held on the 19th inst. at which the powers conferred upon the Inspector of Buildings under the provisions of Ordinance #82, section 94c, approved July 25th, 1902, were fully discussed, Mr. Edward D. Preston, Inspector of Buildings, stated that, while he had full authority under said ordinance to demolish the buildings condemned by him, yet he was practically powerin cases where the buildings were conanted.

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
