I beg to reply to your favor of January 15th. No deed for the bed of Main Avenue has been accepted under the provisions of the ordinance to which you refer. You will find that the ordinance provides that the bed of said Avenue may be accepted after completion of certain grading, curbing &c., and after approval of the work by the City Engineer. If you will advise me that the work has been completed in accordance with the provisions of the Ordinance, I will undertake to secure a deed of the street bed.

Answering your inquiry as to whether or not a macadamized street is to be considered as a paved street within the meaning of the ordinance authorizing you to require brick sidewalks to be laid upon paved streets, I advise you that, in my judgment, a macadamized street is a paved street.
