Referring to our conversation yesterday relative to alterations to sidewalk and removal of awning at the northwest corner of McHenry St. and Fremont Avenue, beg to state that we have endeavored on several occasions to come to some reasonable agreement with the property owner to permit of the removal of certain portion of the awning attached to his building, but his demands are so exorbitant that we are compelled to seek some other means of getting around the difficulty. You understand we are perfectly willing to pay him a reasonable amount for damages. It has therefore occurred to us that probably your Department might undertake this work for use, which would include the alterations to the sidewalk as well as cutting off a portion of the awning. I think it quite likely that your Department could carry on this work without any serious objection on the part of the property owner, and we would be willing, of course, to stand back of the City, and should any trouble arise we would be responsible.
