I reply to your letter of the 17th instant, relative to paragraph 1, on page 26 of Storm-Water Contract No. 2. In my judgment, the contention of the contractor is not maintainable. His rights as I see them are as follows:- So long as he excavates in tunnel, he is entitled to receive for the rock, actually excavated, the price specified in his proposal, and if, in addition to the removal of rock, he also actually excavates earth, he is entitled to receive such additional compensation as the contract calls for.

Dear Sir:-

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Referring to the letter from the Inspector of Buildings to yourself, dated the 18th inst., I beg leave to say that there is no general ordinance of the City providing that "one hundred numbers (house) shall be the proportion for each square, and that each successive square shall have its enumeration to begin with an even hundred." These requirements are found only in Ordinance
