Dear Sir:-

I hand you herewith a letter from Mr. Hood, enclosing a copy of an opinion from Mr. Carter, and shall be glad to have you instruct me as to what action I should take in this case.

Our experience is that unless we have a man on the ground to follow up such work, as the restoration of railway tracks, and the relaying of the paving, that the proper grade of the street is not adhered to by the United Railways Company, and as a result of their work and the Sewerage Commission's work, the street is badly distorted and put out of shape. Of course, after the work is done to the satisfaction of the Sewerage Commission, it is a hopeless case for me to undertake to get the United Railways Company to re-adjust their tracks as they should be.

Do you agree with Mr. Carter's opinion, or do you consider that I have the right to place inspectors on the work, and insist upon the United Railways Company paying for such inspection?
