that it would be a "special pile", which would have to be picked out in the woods and cut to order; this would take at least two weeks, and possibly more.

We believe that the ruling for the growth of timber is 1 inch in every 5'. In other words, a pile 50' long, 18" at the butt, would give an 8" point. By the same rule a 40 foot pile would be 10" at the point. It is also a rule of the trade that unless specially specified a pile is measured over the bark.
