In view of the fact that we placed this building in a condition satisfactory to the Building Inspector, and in view of the further fact that there has been some settlement since, and there is doubt as to whether or not our work is responsible for the present conditions, I would suggest that the matter be laid before the City Solicitor for an opinion as to whether the Sewerage Commission is required to make any further repairs to this building. If it is decided that such repairs must be made, an amount sufficient to cover the cost thereof should be retained from the money we are now holding as a 5% retention on the contract of T. J. O'Connell.
