Will you kindly advise me whether or not there would be any legal objection to the supply of electric current, by a private concern, for the lamps used in the decorative illumination on Franklin street, between Howard and Rutaw streets, in connection with the convention of the Loyal Order of Moose?

Mr. James L. Kernan has a plant in the theatre and hotel just opposite to where our design is to be located and, therefore, this plant could supply the necessary current somewhat cheaper than that offered by the Consolidated Gas, Electric Light and Power Company.
