for the purpose of stringing wires, in order to convey electric current. As I understand your question, the City owns the wires that will be in the public streets, and Mr. Kernan, under the proposed arrangement, will simply furnish the current at a point within his own building line. If I have stated the facts correctly, I know of no legal obstacle in the way of your carrying out your plan, unless there be some existing contract between the City and the Consolidated Gas, Electric Light and Power Company, under which the City is bound to buy all the electric current that it requires for lighting the City streets from said Company.

Dear Sir:

In preparing plans for sanitary sewers in Sanitary District 14, I find conditions, at certain points, regarding which I would like your advice as to the rights and duties of the Sewerage Commission in the premises. These conditions are shown on our drawings 33-1815 and 33-1816, blueprints of which I enclose herewith.

Drawing No. 33-1815 shows three different conditions:

1. There is an existing private drain in the alley marked "X", which alley, I understand, is private property, - as would be indicated by the gate at the Camden street end. Premises 218 to 226 Charles street all have connections to the existing drain,
