Attached, from Messrs. R. B. Tippet & Bro., is respectfully referred.

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You no doubt recall that I wrote you on this subject August 3rd, to which you replied on August 9th, enclosing an opinion of Mr. Charles A. Marshall, under date of August 6th.

I cannot understand why Tippet may not be required to fill up his sidewalk, as provided by the City's Ordinances, just as other people are required. We have been having sidewalks placed along this street, and the White Estate, at considerable expense, graded their sidewalk. I shall also require Mr. Kent, who owns the lot north of Tippet's, to grade his sidewalk. The street is paved and there is a general movement taking place in this section, in the matter of building, and the sidewalk should be put in good condition. Mr. Tippet's lot is a poor lot, down in a hole, and must be filled up in order that it may be made available for building purposes. While this all may be true, I do not know of any exception in the law which would permit Mr. Tippet to refuse to obey the City's Ordinances.
