that point as fulfilling the requirements of the law as regards connection "at the lot line".

As explained in ours of the 1st inst., it is our intention to use, in common with the two abutting properties on said alley a pipe that is to be laid in the alley for the three properties, each property, however, having its separate entrance to the pipe. The Inspector of Plumbing, whom we consulted in the matter, expressed the view that there would be no objection to this arrangement.

Gentlemen:-

I enclose herewith two letters received from the Business Manager of the Felgner Branch of the American Tobacco Company.

I understand that the arrangement of plumbing in the building is such that it would be very expensive to change it so as to make a connection to the sewer in Charles Street, and I see no objection to giving them a connection at the south building line of Pratt Street, inasmuch as they are willing to accept this as being the connection to which they are legally entitled. I would recommend, however, that the matter be referred to the Law Department before final action is taken.
