They desired a permit from this office, and gave me the impression that they had not yet located their hospital. I told them that we had nothing to do with the issuing of the permit, as it came directly under the jurisdiction of the Mayor and City Council. I read them the law of the subject as contained in article 16, and they apparently not being perfectly satisfied, were advised by me to consult a lawyer or to see you, as City Solicitor, concerning their rights in this matter.

Please inform me whether I should take up this report of Capt. Moxley under the provision of Section 5, article 16. By so doing, you will greatly oblige.
