Dear Sir:

Your letter of the 25th ultimo, to the City Solicitor, has been referred to me for reply.

The deed, a copy of which was enclosed therewith, grants to the City the privilege of constructing a sewer in the westhalf of that part of Lewin Avenue therein described, together with the right and privilege of connecting with said sewer any other sewers, drain pipes, etc.

It appears to me that the grant authorizes not alone the construction of a sewer to run along in the bed of Lewin Avenue, but also such lateral connections therewith, within the outlines of the property described in the deed, as may be necessary to carry out the purposes of the Sewerage Commission, in accordance with the Act under which that Commission was created. I think that the construction of such a lateral connection as you mention would be especially a proper proceeding under the grant, in view of the fact that the Act creating
