I beg to call your attention to the case of Cochran vs. Preston, in 108 Md. 220, where the Court of Appeals held that the right to make reasonable regulations concerning the height of buildings in the City is within the police power of the State.

With us here in Baltimore, it is provided, by Ordinance, that no building shall be made more than one hundred and seventy-five feet high, except that towers, spires, and belfries in fireproof buildings may extend to a greater height.
