Dear Sir:

Your favor of January 30th, directed to the City Recorder, has been handed me for reply, and in response to your inquiries therein contained, I beg to advise that it will be necessary for you, in order to sell the character of the goods described, to first obtain from the Clerk of the Court of Common Pleas of this City a license authorizing you to do so.

Such a license will cost \$100.00 for each person engaged in the business of canvassing on foot. If a horse and wagon is used, the sum of \$150.00. If two horses and a wagon are used, the sum of \$200.00.

The law expressly provides that but one person shall trade under any such license, and for any violation thereof imposes a penalty by way of a fine, not exceeding \$100.00 nor less than \$25.00 for each and every offense.
