to be put, said Commissioner of Health shall forthwith register said applicant in a proper record to be kept for the purpose, and issue a permit authorizing such applicant to carry on, engage in and conduct the business applied for in Baltimore City at the place designated in such application."

The above, in my judgment, does not give the Commissioner of Health any discretion in the matter of issuing permits so long as the applicant can convince the Commissioner that the place or places of business and wagons and other vehicles to be used by him in his business are in a sanitary condition and fit for the uses and purposes of the milk business.

Dear Sir:

Replying to yours of October 27th, in reference to the roads in Roland Park, I beg to report as follows:

The Annexation Act of 1918 does not make any special provision for accepting the dedication of streets and highways in the new Annex. In Sec. 11 the Act provides as follows:

"That all roads, streets, avenues, etc., dedicated, accepted and legally condemned under the provision of the Acts of the General Assembly or the common law shall be held to be public highways of Baltimore City."
