Dear Sir:

I have your letter of the 6th instant concerning the removal of dead bodies and quoting the order of the Commissioner of Health issued in January 1919.

From reading Sections 179 to 187, inclusive, of Art. 14 of the City Code of 1906, I come to the conclusion that where a person dies in the City of Baltimore and is buried from the place of death, the certificate to be issued is controlled by Sections 181 and 182.

In cases, however, where the body of any human is removed from the place of death to some other place before burial, that is
