capable, as you have told me, of accommodating other diseases than those specified in the ordinance governing the first hospital.

There is no language in either the enabling Act or the Ordinance limiting the diseases to be treated in the new hospital, and to hold that this old ordinance should be made to apply to this large and modern institution capable of treating all diseases would, in my opinion be an injustice to the citizens of Baltimore and contrary to the intent of the present legislation on the subject.

Consequently I hold and advise you that the Ordinance referred to by you is not applicable to the institution in question, and it should be open to the treatment of such contagious diseases as may be admitted.
