of Estimates, desires to appropriate a sum equal to the proceeds of the sale of the school property above referred to, and such appropriation is approved by the Mayor and City Council, along with the other items in the annual ordinance of Estimates. I think that such appropriation would be valid, and that the Public Improvement Commission would have authority to expend the money for the purpose for which the appropriation was made. This procedure would, of course, be similar to that which has been adopted with reference to the Paving Commission, it receiving appropriations from new loan funds and from the tax levy long after the original loan, which it was created to expend, was exhausted.

Without an appropriation in the annual Ordinance of Estimates, however, there is no way for the proceeds from the sale of old school property to be used by the Public Improvement Commission. We are not dealing with the sale of property previously purchased by the Commission out of its funds.
