However, as stated above, the Neighborhood Association can deny the use of the premises for any political discussion, and such a regulation would be consistent with the character and use of the premises as a "free public recreation center."

Gentlemen:

With reference to the power and authority of the Mayor and City Council of Baltimore to temporarily borrow money in anticipation of the receipts of taxes, and with further reference to the validity of the notes issued and to be issued by the City for the above purpose under a resolution adopted by the Commissioners of Finance at their meeting held on November 16, 1932, I beg to advise you as follows:

By Section 41 of the Charter of Baltimore City (Ch. 515, Laws of Maryland, 1908), the Commissioners of Finance, consisting of the Mayor, Comptroller, Register, and two persons appointed by the Mayor, were constituted as "Head of the Fourth Sub-Department of Finance" of the City of Baltimore.
