Dear Mr. Boesl:

The inquiries contained in your letter of September 26, 1950, have been under study and consideration.

It appears that the Health Department is bound by the provisions of Ordinance No. 741, of May 31, 1938, providing that no licenses would be granted after that date for handling meat or meat food products to "Class A - Slaughterers" or "Class B - Processors and Manufacturers" whose plant or place of business was located beyond the corporate limits of Baltimore City. The records of the Health Department show that, on the effective date of the ordinance, you had a "Class B - Processors and Manufacturers" license to do business within the City of Baltimore. I note from your letter that you feel such an ordinance is prohibiting a trade, discriminates between resident and non-resident, and prevents ingress into the city of county slaughterers, etc.
