2 persons 'decline' which means they can't vote in the Primaries

For the six - day period Dec. 15-20, a total of 108 colored persons registered to vote, according to figures released by the Supervisors of Elections. Sixty-three white persons reg-

This brings to 100,774 the total number of colored persons eligible to vote in the Primary election on March 3, 1959. Still unregistered are 43,442 persons of voting age.

Of the 108 new voters who signed up this week, 83 registered as Democrats and 23 as Republican. Two others regisfered as 'declined'which means they refused to affiliate with either party and can NOT vote in the March primary. They will not be eligible to exerise their voting right until the May 5th General Election.

PERSONS WHO are registering for the first time are urged to affiliate with one of the two parties so then can have a voice in all elections.


