10. Bold programs to curb delinquency.

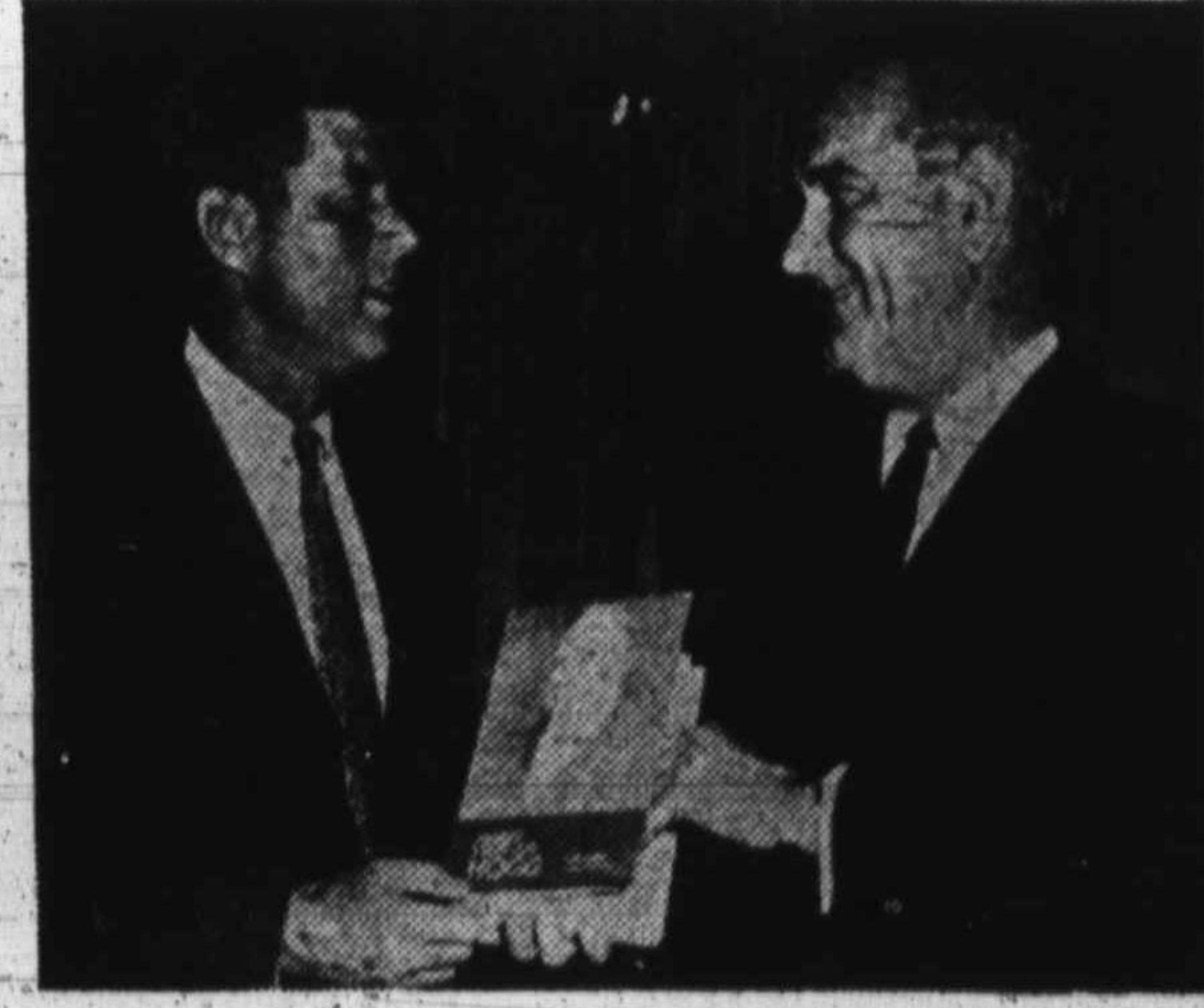
