

DEAN DIXON

MILWAUKEE, WISC., -The first American tour by Dean Dixon, recognized as the world's leading black conductor, will begin Tuesday (19th) and will be sponsored by the Jos. Schlitz Brewing Company.

Dixon returned to the United States last summer after spending 21 years as a leading conductor in Europe. He conducted the New York Philharmonic in its opening concerts in New York City's parks, a program sponsored for six years by Schlitz and the Philharmonic.

The tour will begin with the Kansas City Symphony and will be followed by appearances with the Minnesota Symphony in Minneapolis on January 29, the Milwaukee Symphony. on November 6 and the Detroit Symphony on December 16.

The tour will continue in 1972 with the National Symphony in Washington on February 29, the Chicago Symphony on March 9, and the San Francisco

9:30 a.m. at the Club Dixon has been music director of the Hessicher

Rundfunk orchestra of Frankfurt, Germany, since 1961. Born in New York, Dixon is a graduate of the Juilliard School and of Columbia University, from which he received the Master of Arts Degree.

He made his debut at New York's Town Hall in 1937, conducting the Chamber Orchestra of the League of Music Lovers. Within a few years he became the first black to conduct the major U. S. orchestras.

In 1941 he conducted the NBC Symphony and a year later was guest conductor with the Philharmonic in Lewisohn stadium. He also was guest conductor with the Boston Sympholy and the Philadelphia Orchestra.

From 1944 to 1949 Dixon gave concerts with the American Youth Orchestra which he founded. His work with this group, which did much to popularize contemporary American music, was recognized in 1948 with the award of the (Continued on page 2)
