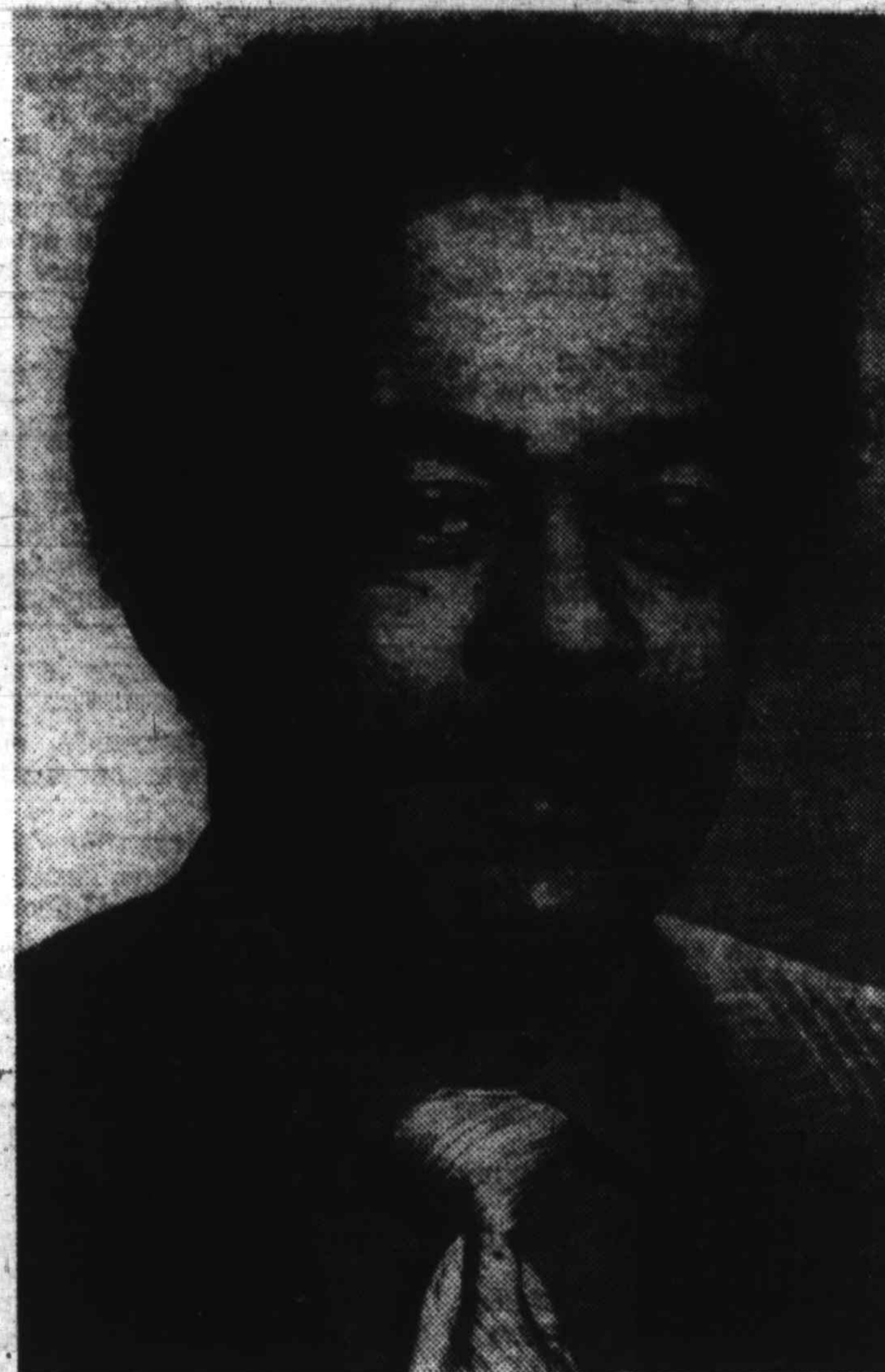

## Slade resigns; Ross takes post

Tom Ross, WBAL-TV Assistant Manager of Community Service and Producer of TV 11's "Brass Tacks" series, has also been named Executive Producer of "North Star," a series of programs highlighting accomplishments of Baltimore's black residents, televised Sundays at 6-7 p.m.

According to Brent O. Gunts, WBAL-TV Vice President and General Manager who made the appointment, Ross will be responsible for establishing guidelines for program format and content.

He succeeds John Slade, producer and host of "North Star" who resigned. In a letter to members of WBAL-TV's Urban Advisory Council announcing the resignation and appointment, Gunts stated that Slade and his wife, Mrs. Carol Slade, who was "North Star's" first produ-

cer, "have made an excellent contribution to television programming oriented in particular to this area's black citizens, and leave a foundation upon which even more meaningful and diversified programming can be built."

Ross joined WBAL-TV in April of 1969 as Assistant Manager of Community Service. Prior to joining the station he was an elementary school teacher in the Baltimore City school system.

In the spring of 1969 he helped develop WBAL-TV's prestigious "Brass Tacks" series of special Community Service presentations which premiered September 14, 1969. The series of telephone forums is televised in color every Sunday at 10-11 p.m.

From March of 1964 to November, 1965, Ross worked at WBAL-TV as a part-time Operations Director while continuing in his full-time job as a classroom teacher.

He is a captain in the Army Inactive Reserve, with eight years of active duty in the Far East. He attended Baltimore City public schools and received a bachelor of science degree in elementary education from Coppin State College and a master of science in elementary education from Morgan State College in 1970.

WBAL-TV's "North Star" program scheduled for January 31 will feature a special filmed presentation of an address made in November of 1970 by Whitney M. Young, Jr., Executive Director of the National Urban League.
