While credit for the consumer is more readily available and cheaper than it has been for months, Mr. Gleason cautioned that a return to higher interest rates later this year is expected by many as the economy begins to expand.

Family purchases, such as a new car and new major appliances should be made on a total financing program worked out with the family banker, he pointed out. This is what businesses do and usually is more economical than paying off, separate purchases, he said.

mum interest rates set by But now "banks are able to obtain deposits and other lending funds at more responsible rates. No responsible family seeking to own a home is denied needed credit."

Families with savings accounts who were able to obslowing down inflation, cut tain 5-1/2 per cent and 6 per cent on their funds last year with a guarantee from their bank that the rate would be maintained for five years, or in some cases as long as 10 years, would do well to make their major purchases or pay income taxes with installment loans rather than dip into those accounts, Mr. Gleason said.

Although rates on loans are higher than that being paid for the savings, the difference will not be as great as the probable longterm loss of 1 per cent to 1-1/2 per cent on funds kept in the bank, he said.
