

(Continued from Page 17) Wells-Shipman-Ward, built exactly 100 years after the Rocky Hill-Glastonbury Ferry went into service, stands amid flowering rhododendrons.

This superb example of mid-18th century Connecticut River Valley architecture is furnished with period pieces guaranteed to delight both antique buffs and anyone interested in life in the Connecticut colony.

Behind the house, an 18th century herb garden fills the air with the scent of thyme, rosemary and rue. (Open June to mid-October, Sundays, 2 p.m. to 4 p.m. Adults, 50 cents; children, 25

The tour route now follows Routes 17, 66 and 151 southward to Middle Haddam, a village that still remains much of its turn-of-the-19thcentury herb garden fills village that still retains travelers, Middle Haddam was once a thriving shipbuilding center, sending packets and clippers to foreign trading ports from London to China.

Georgian, Federal and early Victorian mansions coexist in a harmonious architectural potpourri, all apparently dreaming of Middle Haddam's past.

From Middle Haddam the route drifts eastward past the Salmon River Cove, then south again on Route 151, 196 and 149 to East Haddam, the home of the elegantly restored Goodspeed Opera

Built in 1876 by shipping magnate William H. Goodspeed, the opera house )a small-scale version of the Paris Opera) enjoyed great popularity while Goodspeed's packets plied the Connecticut River.

The House fell on evil days, however, after Goodspeed's death in 1882, serving for a while as a militia headquarters and even as a garage. By the 1960's it was threatened with destruction until a group of theatre lovers restored it to its former magnificence in 1971.

The saucily Victorian sixstory building now houses Broadway-bound plays and musicals from early May to mid-November. Even if an evening in the theatre doesn't fit into your schedule, a visit to the Opera House is worthwhile; its ornate, gilded interior gives a glimpse of what theatregoing was like back in the days of Mrs. Fiske and James O'Neill.

Next door to the Goodspeed, Gelston House, a charmingly remodeled inn with a terrace overlooking the river, is an excellent spot to catch your breath. Here you can enjoy drinks, sandwiches or more substantial fare while watching the bustling river traffic pass through the world's longest single-span cantilever

William Gillette, who achieved fame in the 1890's with his portrayal of Sherlock Holmes, considered turning the Goodspeed into a Shakespearean theatre. Instead, he built himself a 24-room "castle" on a rocky crag overlooking the nearby town of Hadlyme, a mere 10-minute drive away, along Routes 82 and 148.

Constructed between 1914 and 1919 of Connecticut fieldstone, the "castle" is a perfect setting for a Sherlock Homes "thriller." One almost expects to find Professor Mariarty in every closet. No two rooms are in the same style; turrets and balconies set the stage for dramatic appearances (and disappearances) and an arrangement of mirrors allows anyone in the master bedroom to keep an eye on happenings in the living room. The house is set in 184 forested acres where visitors can wander at will or picnic beneath the trees. (Open daily from Memorial to Columbus Days, 11 a.m. to 5 p.m. Admission, 50 cents.)

From Hadlyme the "minitour" continues along Route 148 to the Connecticut River where you drive aboard the ferry to Chester.
