Who wrote "If we must die, let it not be like hogs?"

Claude McKay (1891-1948) was a major figure in the Harlem Renaissance. McKay was born in Jamaica and had received some notice as a poet before coming to the United States. He studied at Tuskegee and Kansas State before coming to Harlem where he held menial jobs while writing poetry. He edited two radical publications in the United States before traveling extensively in Burope and Africa, settling eventually in France. His "Home to Harlem" spoke of his return. This a. works were popular, but his militant sonnets such as "If We Must Die" have come to be his most admired work.

After practicing law and teaching school for several years, James Weldon Johnson joined his brother, J. Rosamond Johnson, in New York and collaborated with him in composing musical comedies. J. Rosamond set his brother's famous poem "Lift Every Voice and Sing" to music in 1900. Since that time, the song has been adopted as the Negro National Anthem. James Weldon Johnson was later to serve as executive secretary of the J. Rosamond enjoyed a successful career in musical

Were there any black filmmakers during the early days of silent films?

Oscar Micheaux was the first to complete a feature-length film, "The Homesteader," based on his experiences as a frontiersman in South Dakota. He was not however, the first black to make a feature film. The first was Booker T. Washington's secretary, Emmett Scott. He made a film protesting and refuting D. W. Griffith's "Birth Of a Nation," which portrayed the black during Reconstruction as corrupt and lawless. Scott ran out of money and had to seek white backers who insisted on changes. Micheaux prouded more than a dozen silent films. He also produced the first all-black talking picture.

Who was the first black to receive the Pulitzer Prize in Poetry?

Miss Gwendolyn Brooks, who in private life is Mrs. Henry L. Blakely, was born in Kansas but has lived most of her life in Chicago. She became the first black to receive the Pulitzer Prize in poetry in 1950 for her second book of poems. She was named poet laureate of Illinois in 1968.

What meant by "Negritude?"

"Negritude" was coined as a means of protest by poets of the Caribbean and their Frenchspeaking African friends in Paris during the 1940's and 1950's. The movement was started by Martinique poet Aime Cesaire when he wrote Notes on Going Home in 1939. The president of Senegal in West Africa " vole-Senghor, is » often -11 . 
When he finished school in Philadelphia he moved to Atlanta, Georgia, to teach drawing at Clark University.
