Romeo B. Garrett Unfortunately, our research does not pin down a date of the Micheaux films. The first fullall-black film "Brightright," was made by Micheaux in 1918, and over the next 20 years, he produced and sold a film a year.

The "Homesteader" was a story written by Micheaux, but we can find no dates of its being made into a motion picture.

As for E. J. Scott, following the protests over the film "Birth of a Nation," he hired a writer to script a movie which would reply to the Griffith classic.

At the time, Scott was secretary to Booker T. Washington at Tuskegee. Sufficient capital for the film was never acquired, and the film project failed.
