In addition to the technical training and educational benefits of the soldier's regular daily experience, you can accrue college or technical school education funds of up to \$8,100.


While you are in the service you can designate as little as \$25 or as much as \$100 per month toward your education under the Veterans Educational Assistance Program (VEAP). For every dollar you contribute to the program, the Army matches it with \$2. You may contribute up to \$2,700 and get matching VEAP funds of \$5,400 for a maximum of \$8,100.

If at the end of your two-year enlistment you decide not to continue your education, the Army will refund the amount of

money you've invested. If you decide to re-enlist, you can be eligible for an additional enlistment bonus.
