

Juneteenth

Emancipation Day observances fall on different days, in different states throughout the South: In Texas, it falls on June 19 and residents of the Lone Star State have observed Emancipation Day since it became a legal holiday in 1980.

But June 19 has a special meaning to black Texans. To them, the day is called Juneteenth, an event that has been celebrated in the black community 115 years.

Juneteenth or Emancipation Day as it now is called is special because it is the only state holiday based upon an important event in black history - the freeing of Texas slaves in 1865, more than two and a half years the Emancipation Proclaimation was issued.

A number of unofficial black holidays are observed in different parts of the nation, but none are recognized by the state or federal government with the exception of Martin Luther King's birthday.

King's birthday is recognized in the District of Columbia and 10 states on various days in January. A movement also is underway to make King's birthday a national holiday.

Holidays such as Kwanza, celebrated during the Christmas season, Malcolm X's birthday, recognized on May 19 and Uhuru Day, commemorating the 1965 Watts Riot in Los Angeles are becoming more widely known throughout the black community.

But back in Texas, blacks are proud of their own Juneteenth. Vickie Roberts Henry, in a June 21, 1980 article in the Callas Post Tribune, expressed her feelings about the holiday.

"Because true freedom is found only in the propagation of truth, Black Texans are now presented with the unique opportunity to reaffirm the meaning of true freedom presented in the new Texas official State Emancipation Day Holiday...Texas is the first and only state in the nation that has honored black Americans with a holiday in commemoration o injustices suffered by black

Juneteenth's roots can be traced back to the time Abraham Lincoln issued his famous proclamation on January 1, 1863. critics of the day called the proclamation "rather frantic measure, an act of last resort." They said its intent was to gain support of abolitionist groups and others in an effort to rally the beleagured Union, for whom the Civil War

There is an old expression in the Navy, "Someone always fails to get the word." And it happened when word about the Emancipation Proclamation was delayed reaching authorities in Texas. In fact, it took 2% years for Texas blacks to know. Ergo: Juneteenth, the official celebration of the Proclamation.
