- Answers to Black History Quiz 1. Henry Blair who in 1834 registered a seed planter, followed by the registering of a corn harvester in 1836. 2. Initially known as "Saratoga Chips," the potato chip was introduced by African-American Hiram S. Thomas, at his inn near Saratoga, NY.

- 3. Marcus Garvey, founder of the multi-million membership Universal Negro Improvement Association [UNIA], and famed reggae musician/prophet Bob Marley.
- 4. Dr. W.E.B. DuBois, who was also a great Black historian/lecturer/teacher and proponent of Pan-Afrikanism who spent the last years of his life in Ghana where he is now buried. Dr. DuBois is also noted for his widely read book, The Souls of Black Folk.
- 5. Lewis Latimer. Edison's bulbs would burn out very quickly. With Latimer's invention the bulb finally became a usable item. Latimer also invented the world's first electric lamp with a carbon filament, drew the design for Alexander Graham Bell's telephone patent, and wrote the first book in 1890, on the electrical lighting system.
- 6. Martin R. Delaney who worked stringently in the 19th century as a "Back-to-Africa" emigrationist.
- 7. Rosa Parks, whose courageous act (December 1, 1955) of wearily refusing to give up her seat to a white man on a Montgomery, Alabama bus sparked the massive and successful bus boycott in that city and subsequently throughout the South; a campaign which ushered Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr., to international prominence as one of the greatest
- mass leaders of all times. 8. SNCC [Student Non-Violent Coordinating Committee], along with Civil Rights activists Fannie Lou Hamer and Bob Moses, builders of the Mississippi Freedom Democratic Party and the Lowndes County Freedom Organization, popularly called the Black Panther Party, and which provided the inspiration and symbol for the subsequent Black Panther Party developed by Newton and Seale.
- 9. Astronomer almanac-creator Benjamin Banneker, who also worked on plans for the nation's capital. 10. Rosamond Johnson and his brother, James Weldon
- Johnson, one of the noted writers of the Harlem Renaissance period. The poem of James Weldon Johnson was set to music by his brother Rosamond, and subsequently became known as "The Negro National Anthem."
