

Through the Broncos' first seven games, Nelson, a 6-7 junior forward, was their No. 2 scorer (15.1 points per game) and leading rebounder (8.4 per game). James, a 6-9, 230-pound, senior center, was the No. 3 scorer (13.9) and No. 2 rebounder (6.5). He was all-CIAA as a junior.
