28 The Studio Museum in Harlem

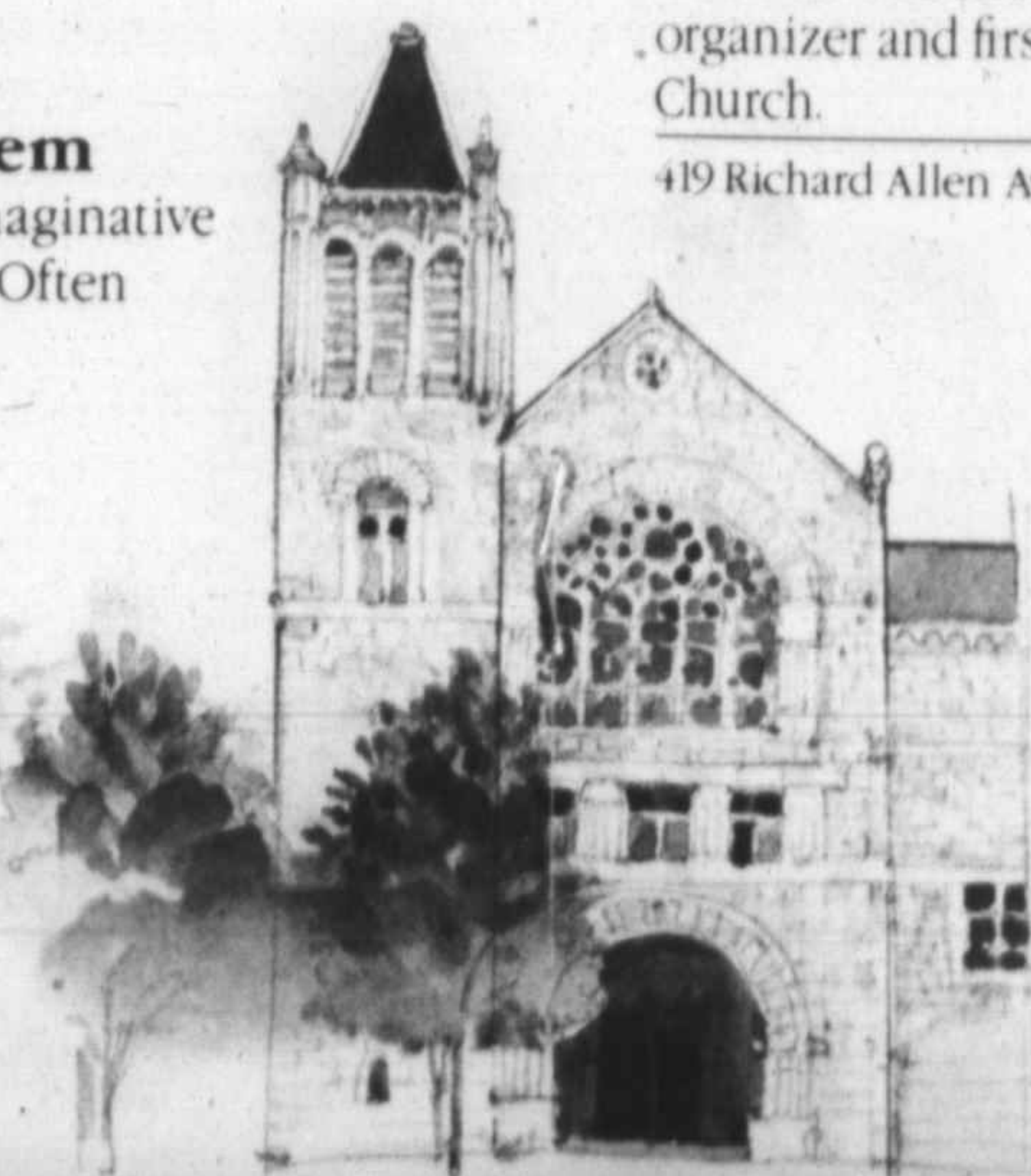
A major Black gallery featuring highly imaginative exhibits and a superbly hung permanent collection. Often showcases important up and coming Black Artists.

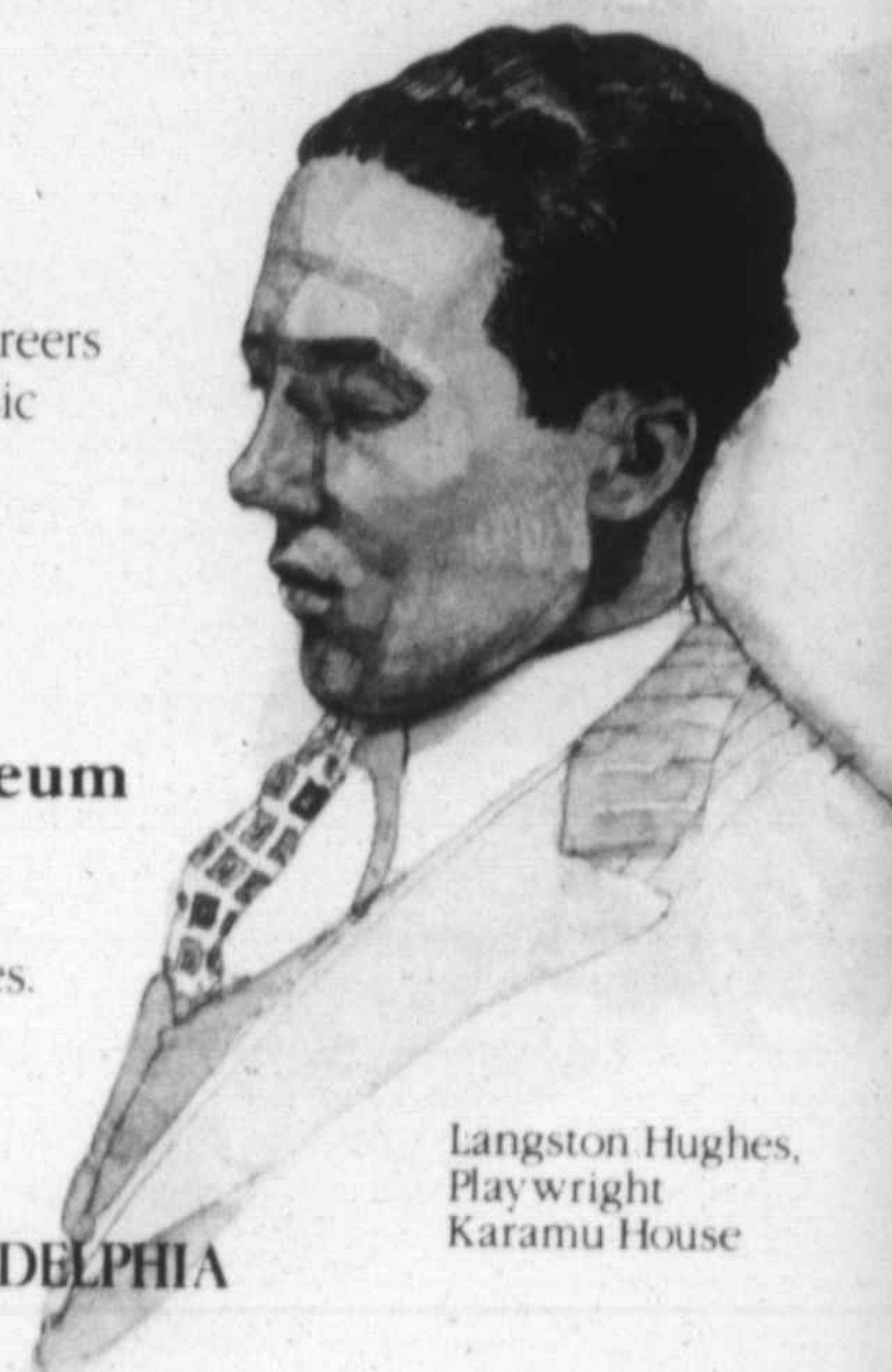
South Carolina COLUMBIA

33 Mann-Simons Cottage—Museum of African-American Culture

Built circa 1850, the home of Celia Mann, a free Black woman and her family for more than a hundred years. It was restored in 1977 and established as an African-American Historic House Museum in 1978 by the Richland County Historic Preservation Commission.
