Fort Sumter National Monument
Site of the first shelling of the Civil War, April 12, 1861.
Also the site of the daring and brave exploits of the Black coastal pilot, Robert Smalls. Smalls sailed the Confederate ship "Planter" from Fort Sumter and delivered it to the Union forces. He served several terms as a Congressman for South Carolina.

Planning ahead

Make every minute of your trip count by planning ahead. Block out an itinerary and pencil in your daily activities on a calendar. If the sites are in one city, use a map to make out your routes so that you can cover as much ground as possible. Take advantage of <u>free</u> information from motor clubs and state and city visitor's bureaus. Contact tourist bureaus and convention centers to find out what events may be taking place in the cities you intend to visit. Be sure to <u>call ahead</u> to verify addresses and directions, visitor's hours and prices of admission.

What and how to pack

Call ahead to check on the weather of the places you intend to visit. Then be sure to pack as lightly as possible. Soft luggage and a rolled packing method should cut down on bulk. Don't forget a portable luggage cart—porters and bellmen may not exist everywhere you go.

Read and research

Get books from the library so you and your kids can read up on the places you intend to see. Encourage them to use this information as the subject of papers for school. The more involved they are, the more fun your trip will be.

When you return

Make a permanent souvenir of your trip that can serve as a lasting memory. Be sure to keep a journal to illustrate good and bad points and to help you plan for future trips. Take plenty of pictures and get postcards and information from places you've visited. Remember, these bits and pieces are adding to a scrapbook of your history.
