In 1939, sculptor AUGUSTA SAVAGE created a special work for the New York World's Fair, "Lift Every Voice and Sing", a 16-foot harp whose strings were Black children, standing erect and singing. Also in the 1930s, she became the first Black member of the National Association of Women Painters and Sculptors.

DECEMBER

RICHARD WRIGHT, author of the best-sellers "Native Son" and the autobiographical "Black Boy", died in Paris in 1960. His landmark study on Black poverty in urban areas.

In 1863, COL. ROBERT G. SHAW, a white officer and a Harvard graduate, led the 54th Massachusetts (colored) Infantry in a charge against a Charleston battery. He and 44 percent of his soldiers were killped Shaw's mutilated body and threw him and his men into a mass grave.
