Boy, 12, killed instantly

When 12-year-old Raymond Toulson walked to the neighborhood store to buy flavored ice, the last thing that should have been on his mind as he walked back home, was being struck by fall-

However, earlier this week, Raymond was killed instantly when he was struck by a concrete slab over three feet long that fell from the George B. Murphy Homes on Argyle Avenue where he lived.

Raymond was the son of Herman L. Toulson, a correctional officer who was stabbed to death at the Maryland State Penitentiary, October 6.


