

"Wendy Nicole Edgerton enrolled at Morgan State University as a pre-law student so that she could help her people to feel good about themselves. Perhaps she thought of helping the same type of person who is responsible for her death," said aunt, Crispan Wendy's Campbell.

The body of 19 year old Wendy Nicole Edgerton was found on Monday evening in a

grassy depression located in the rear of her apartment building in the 4900 block of Goodnow Road.

Sgt. Rodger Nolan of the Baltimore Police Department said, "The body of Miss Edgerton was found clothed only in a denim skirt and underpants. Her hands had been tied behind her back and a plastic bag placed over her head. An autopsy conducted by the medical examiner in-


'Du' Burns portrait hung at City Hall

Problems widespread

The Housing Authority of Baltimore City has published Joulson tragedy. the results of an investigation on the condition of the balgonies at the George B. Murphy Homes.

The investigation, conducted by Morabito Consultants Inc., was prompted by the death of 12-year-old Raymond Toulson, who was struck by a chunk of cement that fell from a ninth floor balcony.

tifies certain structural flaws in the balconies that may have contributed to the
