Training academy to relocate

College Board of Trustees has unanimously approved a lease agreement with the Harford County Sheriff's Office to locate the Sheriff's Office Training Academy on the college campus. Under the terms of the new three-year contract, Harford Communi ty College will be the only college in Maryland with a law enforcement training facility partnership agreement.

Housing the Sheriff's Training Academy on the HCC campus will logistically coordinate the program which is now located in three locations in the county. Coordination of will become more manageable, with enhance communication and expansion of training cooperative arrangements.

In recommending the board's approval, retiring President Alfred C. O'Connell said, "Harford Community College has served the Sheriff's Department for 25 years, and this agreement will be beneficial both for the college and the county Sheriff's Office. It will lead to a more professional staff in all citizens' best interests."

The Collge and the Sheriff's Training Academy share the responsibility for training in workforce requirements of the law enforcement and cor rectional communities of Harford County. The Sheriff's Academy provides basic recruit training for a 25-week period, from July to January. According to an appren-

ticeship agreement developed in 1986, the college provide more than one-third of the basic recruit instruction. The apprenticeship training program includes a five-week field project which is similar to the college's field practicum in criminal justice. Graduates of the Sheriff's Academy are eligible to receive 12-15 credits toward an associate in arts degree ir

program.
The Sheriff's Office also provides in-service training for all personnel which enables them to meet minimum 18-hour annual requirement of the Maryland Police Correctional Training Commission. These short courses on a variety of subjects will also be conducted on the Harford campus.



What are we doing to help you pay for college?

For black students living in urban areas, college too often is a financial drain. But Western Maryland College, a private liberal arts college just 45 minutes northwest of downtown Baltimore, offers generous financial assistance to black students with annual family incomes that range from \$5,000 to \$75,000.

Western Maryland College takes pride in providing each student with a quality, personal education. We participate in the Baltimore Commonwealth Program to help financially needy students attend college, and through that program Western Maryland promises the best possible financial aid packages to students from Baltimore city high schools based on attendance and grade point average. Any student who attends Western Maryland College is eligible for excellent financial aid packages, and more than 60 percent of our students receive some form of financial aid.

Many of the black students at Western Maryland College are graduates of Baltimore city high schools with predominantly black populations. Though their numbers are small, their community is strong. The Black Student Union, an active student organization on the WMC campus, organizes cross-cultural events to share its cultural heritage with the campus community. The group also plans a full month of activities celebrating Black History Month each February and organizes an orientation for black students before they begin classes each fall.

A small college of 1,200 students, Western Maryland stresses high standards and academic achievement in the liberal arts and sciences. For the student whose goal is an excellent education, Western Maryland has the resources — beginning with a faculty that is actively engaged with students in the process of learning to think independently and creatively.

About 85 percent of our 1987 graduates were employed directly after earning their Western Maryland degrees, finding that employers are often looking for someone who has a liberal arts education.
