At the request of James Rumba the following  
 Deed was recorded February 9<sup>th</sup> 1846  
 This Indenture made the 29<sup>th</sup> day of January in the year  
 of our Lord 1846 between Army Delaughter, son of Catharine  
 Delaughter his wife of Frederick County in the State of Maryland  
 of the one part and James Rumba of the County  
 and State aforesaid of the other part Witnesseth that the  
 said Army Delaughter and Catharine Delaughter his  
 wife for and in consideration of the sum of two hundred  
 and fifty dollars to them in hand paid before the sealing  
 of these presents have granted bargained and sold  
 sold and by these presents do grant bargain and sell  
 unto the said James Rumba and his heirs all these  
 tracts or parts of tracts or parcels of land lying and  
 being in the County and State aforesaid being part  
 of a tract of land called Rough Rough beginning  
 for the same at the end of the first line of a tract  
 of land called Mary Mantle Cugg and running  
 thence North 71 degrees West 30 perches South 60 perches  
 South 20 degrees East 26 perches South 52 1/2 perches  
 to a stone planted then bearing the out line running  
 thence with a division line between Frederick &  
 Shipley and Jacob Rice runne North 86 degrees East 20  
 perches to a stone planted North 16 degrees East 15 1/2 perches  
 to a stone planted South 80 degrees East 28 1/2 perches  
 to intersect the sixth line of the whole tract of land  
 at the end of 63 1/4 perches then with said line  
 North 44 degrees East 32 3/4 perches to the end of said  
 line South 39 degrees West 64 perches South 24 degrees  
 East 36 perches then with a strait line to the beginning
