



said Alley, and to use and build upon said wall, it is further agreed that the front room on the first floor above said alley, made by said improvements shall belong to the said house of said Gunstein, and forever to be the property of said Gunstein his heirs and assigns, and the said Frederick Gunstein should he ever desire to improve and raise his said house above his present height shall have the right to build against and use the wall of said Brooks so built upon said Gunstein's wall as aforesaid. It being the true intent and meaning of this agreement that all of the building erected by said Brooks over said alley shall belong to and be the property of said David H. Brooks his heirs and assigns forever except said room particularly specified as aforesaid, which shall be the property of said Gunstein and subject to his exclusive control and ownership. ~

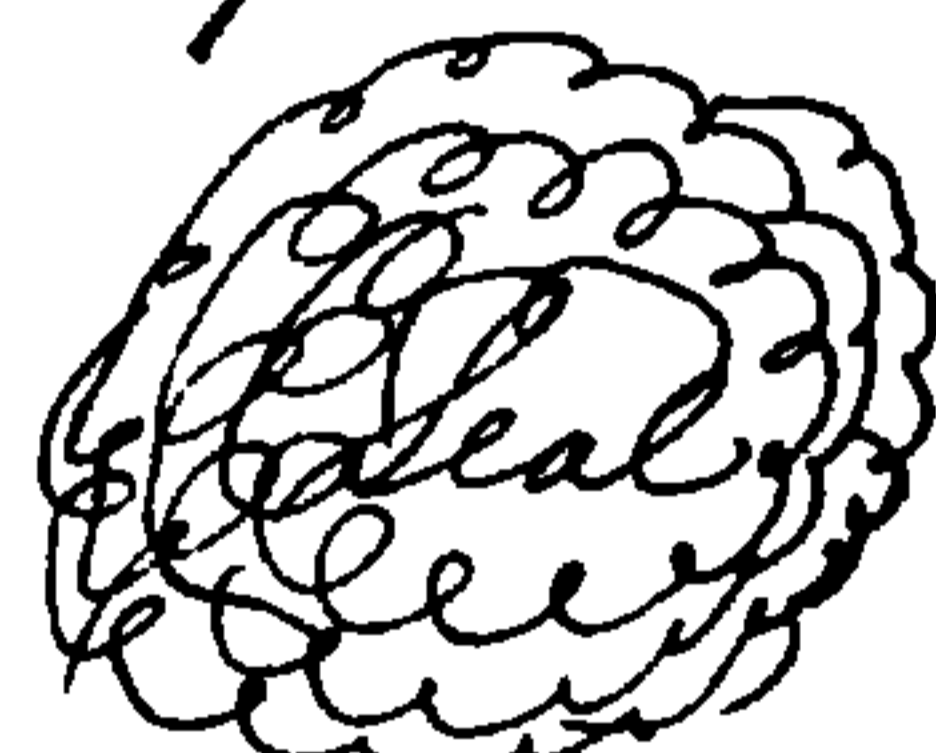
