

12th Inter. As a general thing were you drunk or sober during your visits to your brother Benjamin mentioned in your Examination in chief?
(The Solicitor for Complainants excepts to the answer.)
Answer. I was sober.

13th Inter. At any time between the periods of your visits to your brother from the middle of November until the time of his death were you under the influence of liquor?
(Excepted to by Sol. for Defts.)

Answer. I think I was sober during that period my old brother was in such a state that I would not go there intoxicated.

(Re Examined by Complainants in reply.)

1st Inter. You stated in your cross Examination that after you came to town yesterday morning and had visited the Officer of the Commissioner who is taking testimony in this case, that you then came to my Office and when asked by Mr. Ross as to whether or not your evidence taken in a former case vs. Rachel D. Todd as contained in the Record of said case, was read to you by me you said it was true, I ask you whether the testimony detailed to you in said case vs. Rachel D. Todd was true?

(Note. - The latter clause of this interrogatory is excepted to by Solicitors for Defendants.)

Answer. It was true.
(Excepted to by Sol. for Defts.)

2^d Inter. Was the testimony you have detailed in this Examination true?
Answer. Undoubtedly true.

3rd Inter. Has there ^{ever} been any attempt by the Complainants in this case or by their Solicitors, in any way to induce you to swear in your Examination before this Commission to anything that was not true?
Answer. No Sir.

4th Inter. Have you, or have you not, been time and again cautioned by the Solicitors for the Complainants not to attempt to swear to any thing except such things as you had a perfect knowledge and recollection of; and have you a perfect knowledge and recollection of every thing to which you have testified before this Commission?

Answer. I have. I have a perfect knowledge.

5th Inter. You were asked by Mr. Ross upon your cross Examination whether you ever heard Benjamin Todd of the treatment of his wife (now Mrs. Stone) and one of the Complainants in this case) to him Benjamin Todd and you answered that you did not; You have also said in your Examination in chief that during the year 1866, you did not think that a well man passed over you without your visiting your mother's Benjamin's House and that you often visited his house twice a week, I now ask you whether you know the character of the relations that now subsist between Benjamin Todd and his wife, from the time of their Marriage until the death of Benjamin and if so, state whether those relations were kind and affectionate, or otherwise and upon what
