

the Purchaser or purchasers, giving his, her, or their notes, with approved security and bearing interest from the day of sale; and as soon as they be convenient after any such sale or sales, the said Trustees shall return to this Court, a full, and particular account of the same, with an affidavit of the truth thereof, and of the fairness of such sale, or sales annexed and on the ratification of such sale, or sales by the Court, and on payment of the whole purchase money and not before the said Trustees by a good and sufficient deed to be executed and acknowledged agreeably to law, shall convey to the Purchaser or purchasers of the said property, and to his, her or their heirs, the property to him, her, or them sold, free, clear and discharged of all claim of the parties to this cause, and of any person, or persons claiming by, from, or under them; and the said Trustees shall bring into this Court the money arising on such sale, or sales, and the bonds, or notes which may be taken for the same, to be disposed of under the direction of this Court, after deducting therefrom, the costs of this suit, and such commission to the said Trustees as the Court shall think proper to allow, on consideration of the skill, attention, and fidelity, with which they shall appear to have discharged their trust.
