

Ans: It was, except there was changes by his Order, made.

32nd C. Int: Please state the Changes?

Ans: Well, there was a pair of back stairways put up from the kitchen to the second story. There was a pair of steps put from under the same steps, from the kitchen to the cellar. There was an outside door and frame also put up and there was a partition that was in the Original plan, taken down and removed to another part of the house. There was a hall on the Original plan, that ran through the Centre of the building. The way we put it up, it was done according to his Order. There was a partition put across the hall, back of the front stairway. It consequently would throw the back part of the hall into what was called the dining room. Of course that left a partition out. Not put up, but run a partition across the hall in its stead, which gave as much work as the partition did as was left out. These are all the Changes that I recollect of, I havent seen the plan or been in the house for a long time. I dont recollect any other Changes. I am unable to say whether the design in the book is a larger square, or a smaller square, than the one we were to put up.

33rd C. Int: Then, with the exception or Changes spoken of by you, you was to build a house in exact accordance with said plan, for the sum of \$1700, were you not?

Ans: Yes Sir, except the foundation and plastering.

34th C. Int: Was it or not, part of the agreement, when said building was to be commenced and when finished? If yes, State it?

Ans: There was a time. It was to be commenced shortly after the foundation was completed and was to be completed that fall.

35th C. Int: What time in the fall of the year, and of what year?

Ans: The fall of 1871. I dont recollect what time in the fall.

36th C. Int: Was anything stated in reference to the payments, and if yes, what?

Ans: Well, he wanted to do \$600 worth of hauling and pay the balance when it was completed, or shortly afterwards.

37th C. Int: How much was he to pay you in money?

Ans: The balance after the deduction of the hauling, which J. W. Sefton was to do. I was to take \$600 worth out in hauling, and if I had any more hauling to do, and he done it, it was to come off the bill, & the balance was to be paid in money on the completion of the house, or shortly afterwards.

38th C. Int: At the time you entered into the contract with Sefton, what means had he of doing your hauling?

Ans: I am unable to say, whether at the time he had his team together, or not. I think he had a few horse team at the time, but I am not exactly certain.

39th C. Int: What were you engaged in in the Spring of 1871? State fully all branches of trade you were engaged in, at that time.

Ans: We had a "Sash, Door and Blind Factory". We also contracted for the putting up of buildings. We were also engaged in the lumber
